You will then be prompted to select where the document should be downloaded. We recommend "My Drive." You now have your own copy of the document and are able to personalizE it. - Use single spaces after periods, unless you're typing on a typewriter.
- Do not set off "too" with a comma. (Ex. She wanted to go to the store too.)
- Commas go before and after states when accompanied by a city. (Ex. The family moved from Bend, Oregon, in 1989.)

| Use a comma and conjunction when joining two independent clauses. (Ex. They went to bed, but they brushed their teeth first.) Neither nor constructions take a singular verb. (Ex. Neither Brad nor Brenda is free tonight.) |
